Ramadan is the most sacred month of the year for Muslims. During the entire month, Muslims fast every day from sunrise to sunset. Community Iftars break the day's fast and prayers are ways to celebrate the holiday.

Since 2001, our congregation has hosted an Iftar dinner to extend our goodwill and support for Bloomington's Muslim community. We also open our meeting room for prayer. Our congregation's role is to provide a safe, welcoming, and accepting environment.

On a personal note, I was so grateful to have our new carpet in the sanctuary which created a more sacred environment for the prayers which take place there each year. Several of the members from the Islamic community noticed this changed as well and expressed their gratitude. Thanks to our Special Purposes Fund Committee for making this important transformation possible.

Beginning last year, under the leadership of Judy Berkshire, efforts were increase to make the dinner more "green" by using stainless flatware and china plates, recycling or reusing aluminum and other serving pans, and sharing leftovers with those who experience food insecurity. With the help of the Green Sanctuary Task Force, they added composting plate scrapings to our efforts.

Save Hoosier Healthcare Campaign Kickoff

Recently, a member connected me with a community organizer working on Healthcare issues here in Indiana. Because of that meeting, we invited another person involved to our social justice circle to share updates about an important issue that's rising (and our chance to help). Below is more information - I hope that you can attend the May 29 event at the library (and then there will be other public actions in the summer and fall).

Every Hoosier has struggled to navigate our healthcare system to get the care we need. Too many of us have to choose between paying for prescriptions or medical bills or our utilities. Doctors, patients, and caregivers all have to deal with a confusing and unforgiving bureaucracy in order to provide and receive care. And it's about to get worse for all of us: unnecessary and burdensome new reporting requirements will kick thousands of Hoosiers off their healthcare next year if we don't do something about it.

Alert from the MidAmerica UU Regional Office: Scammers Posing as Congregation Leaders

Friends,

Several UU congregations in our region have reported that their members are receiving scam emails that are requesting gift card donations for a charitable cause. At least one person in the MidAmerica UU Region has lost money to these scams.

A good rule of thumb with emails you're not expecting is to: (1) contact the sender through another channel (call, text, visit website) and (2) not click on a link (or send money, gift cards, etc.) without clarifying that the email is from a trusted source.

Garden Tower Caretakers Needed
Sign Up Here to Help Feed, Water, and Harvest



The UU Church was given a garden tower which our children helped put together on the patio outside the main kitchen. Families can enjoy the lettuces (now!), stevia, and ever-bearing strawberries planted in the "pockets" all summer. Wiggler worms in the central compartment will turn vegetable and non-citrus fruit scraps into nutrients for the plants.

Here's how you can help:

- The worms need to be fed food scraps twice a week throughout the growing season.
- As food scraps are added, the tower needs to be rotated 90 degrees to the right.
- Liquid in the bottom drawer needs to be poured onto dirt at the tower top to recirculate nutrients that drain into it.
- And unless we've recently had an inch of rain, the plants need to be watered - from the top twice a week, by filling the nearby green

watering can three times. You can fill the watering can at the main kitchen sink or use the spigot under the kitchen windows. (Tool to turn the spigot on is in the shelf on the hose reel near the terrace.)

Harmony School

Serving 220 children from Pre-K through 12th grade, Harmony does not receive any public funding or vouchers and therefore is very reliant on scholarship funds. Over 40% of the students are economically disadvantaged

and 80% receive a scholarship in order to attend Harmony. Funds raised from UU Bloomington would help make it possible for the school to educate and empower students from all backgrounds and incomes.

Team First Book of Monroe County

Our mission is simple and focused: "To provide the children from low income families in Monroe County with free new books that they can own and take home." Representatives from EarthKeepers will be in Fellowship Hall between services on Sunday, May 26th, to answer questions and help you sign up for their new pickup/drop-off system. Starting on June 2nd there will be a drop off cabinet (pictured below) next to the small shed on the south side of the church parking lot for your food scraps and more.*

Starting June 1, you will be able to sign up and pay on their website here: tinyurl.com/UUCB-compost-dropoff. There will be two options: pay per bucket, or sign up for a monthly subscription.


1. Per-bucket rental: Exchange a full bucket for an empty one on Sundays

- On Sundays the drop-off cabinet will be unlocked between 10:00 and 11:15 am.
- Drop off the full bucket at the cabinet.

- Rent an empty bucket in Fellowship Hall between services: \$3.00 for each new 1.5-gallon bucket \$6.00 for each new 5-gallon bucket

2. <u>Monthly subscription:</u> \$12 for four weeks of unlimited drop-off service

- Monthly subscribers will be given a 1.5 gallon bucket and a code to unlock the cabinet.
- Empty the bucket into the cabinet's bin, any day and time.
- Take the emptied bucket home, clean as needed, and reuse.

Kids Clothing Collection

The International Outreach Task Force will be making its biannual trip to Kenya in September. The group will visit the three places that our task force supports: Ndethya, the Kathonzweni women's agricultural cooperative; Msamaria Mwema, a small AIDS orphanage in Kibiciku; The Spurgeon School in Kibera with 500 students.

Children's clothing donations will benefit the orphanage and the school. We need K-12 clothes. (There are no infants or very young children.) In particular we need boys clothes and teen clothes for both boys and girls. The collection will be from now until August 25th.

There is an IOTF bin in the hallway for any donations. They will be carried to Africa by our local travelers.

In addition to the clothing collection, the task force will be distributing the funds that we have raised in the last two years. The task force goes to visit the school, the orphanage, and the co-op to talk to the local people running these places and to see and understand what they need. We respect their perception of their needs and verify that donations are being used for their intended purposes.

Buy Grocery Cards on Sunday and Support the Church

We have grocery gift cards for sale in the Commons every Sunday between services. The participating grocery stores send a percentage of your purchases back to the church to support our operating budget. UU History for You

HOW A UNITARIAN GEOLOGIST SUPPORTED THE EVOLUTIONARY WORK OF A UNITARIAN NATURALIST



Charles Lyell (1797-1875) was born in Kinnordy, Scotland and died in London. His family was independently wealthy. Young Lyell loved nature walks and reading in his father's library. At Oxford he chose geology as his favorite study but went to London to become a lawyer. His vision deteriorated, so he dropped law and became a full-time geologist. His 3-volume text *Principles of Geology* went through ten editions. He argued that "the present is a key to the past," and each past geological era was produced by slow accumulation of changes. The process is called uniformitarianism. He rejected that these

eras were a consequence of new creations by God. He was Unitarian in his beliefs and felt God had a role to play in the origin of life and the universe. He did not accept Darwin's theory of evolution through natural selection until he was preparing his 10th edition of *Principles of Geology*. He became friends with Darwin, who used Lyell's books on his trip around the world, confirming many of Lyell's predictions. --Elof Carlson, UUCB historian
