Green Sanctuary Task Force Supports CanopyBloomington

If you look around, you might think that Bloomington has plenty of trees, but the reality is that our tree canopy is in decline. Impending threats from climate change, age, development, storms, disease and pests are real, and require strategic planning and elevated care and planting procedures. The greatest lack of tree canopy is in our lowest income neighborhoods. To raise the tree canopy in these neighborhoods to the average level enjoyed by Bloomington as a whole would involve planting 50,000 trees, and we would still not be at our tree capacity!
